Introduction

Digital estate planning ensures that trusted people can access, manage or close your digital accounts and assets if you die or become incapacitated.

Understanding Your Digital Estate

Your digital estate includes computers, phones, tablets, email accounts, cloud storage, social media, online subscriptions, websites, digital photographs, financial accounts and cryptocurrency.

Why Digital Estate Planning Matters

Without instructions, family members may be unable to access valuable records, photographs, business information or financial assets. Some accounts may become inaccessible forever.

Creating a Digital Asset Inventory

Prepare a complete inventory of devices, online services, subscriptions, websites, domain registrations, financial services and cloud storage accounts.

Devices and Physical Access

Record details of computers, mobile devices, external drives, NAS systems and backup devices. Note where devices are stored and who may

access them.

Password Management and Security

Use a password manager where possible. Document emergency access procedures, recovery codes, multi-factor authentication methods and security keys.

Apple, Microsoft and Google Accounts

Document Apple ID, Microsoft Account and Google Account recovery arrangements. Consider trusted contacts, legacy access features and recovery keys.

Social Media and Online Presence

Specify whether social media accounts should be memorialised, transferred, archived or deleted. Include Facebook, Instagram, X, LinkedIn and similar services.

Financial Digital Assets

Record online banking, share trading accounts, payment services, cryptocurrency wallets and online businesses. Keep records current.

Websites and Domain Names

Document website ownership, hosting providers, domain registrations, renewal arrangements and administrator accounts.

Digital Photos and Family History

Identify where family photographs, videos, genealogy records and personal archives are stored and who should receive them.

Again the conversation was varied, from planned holidays, places visited, hobbies and venues the CLT group could visit in 2027.

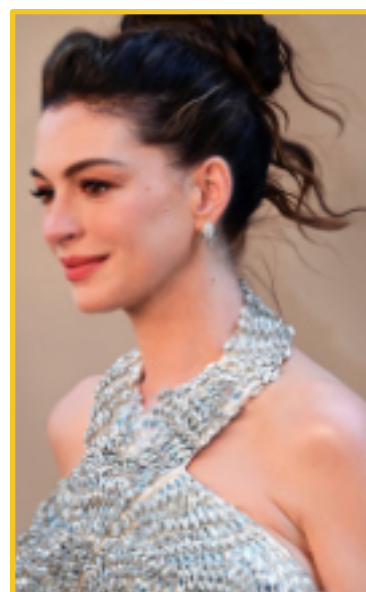
Cinema Group

The Odyssey



The Odyssey is a 2026 epic action fantasy film written and directed by Christopher Nolan, who produced it with his wife Emma Thomas. In the film, Odysseus (Damon), the Greek king of Ithaca, undergoes a long and perilous journey home after the Trojan War and encounters mythical beings as he attempts to reunite with his wife Penelope (Hathaway).



Hidden Treasure in Kelmscott



On a chilly late July morning, members from U3A Armadale, U3A Lesmurdie & Kalamunda met at St Mary in the Valley Anglican church in Kelmscott, which was organised by Maureen Pease, for a scrumptious morning tea and to listen to the history of the church organ.

St Mary in the Valley Anglican Church, has a long and proud history. The original church was established in 1871 by pioneering families, including the Buckinghams, and also served as the district's first school. Today, the historical graveyard is listed by the Heritage Council of Western Australia.

Many people are surprised to learn that Kelmscott is home to the oldest working pipe organ in the Southern Hemisphere. Housed in St Mary in the Valley Anglican Church, this remarkable instrument was built in England around 1751, and was located at St Mark's Anglican church in Eccles, Kent, before being purchased for \$125,000 by Dudley Bastian, and making its journey to Western Australia in 1970 and restored in 1973 by Graham Devonish.

After suffering significant termite damage, the organ underwent a painstaking restoration completed in 2013, returning many of its original features and preserving an important piece of musical history. Locals raised over \$70,000 towards paying for the restoration by sheer dedication and fund raising. One main contributor gave \$50,000 towards the fund, another \$5,000, the City of Armadale \$5,000, with any balance

outstanding paid by Lotterywest. This hidden gem is a reminder that some of Western Australia's most significant heritage treasures can be found right in our own community.

The day concludes with a visit to Peel Estate Wines for a tasting, completing the journey of coastal scenery, historic and timeless elegance.

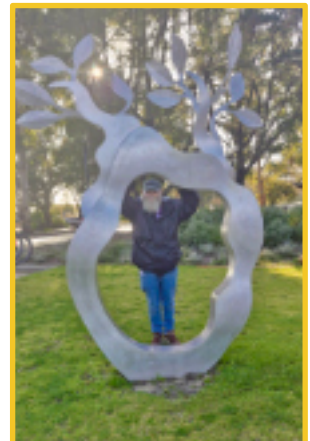
Report from Hotham Valley - Etmilyn Train

Food for Thought Course (May/June)



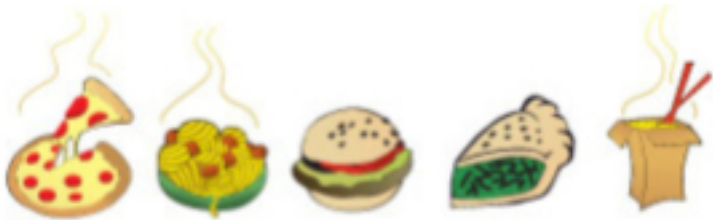
Monday 15 June saw the completion of our “Food For Thought” course held at the Waterwheel Shed over four weeks.

After she retired she started writing and publishing.

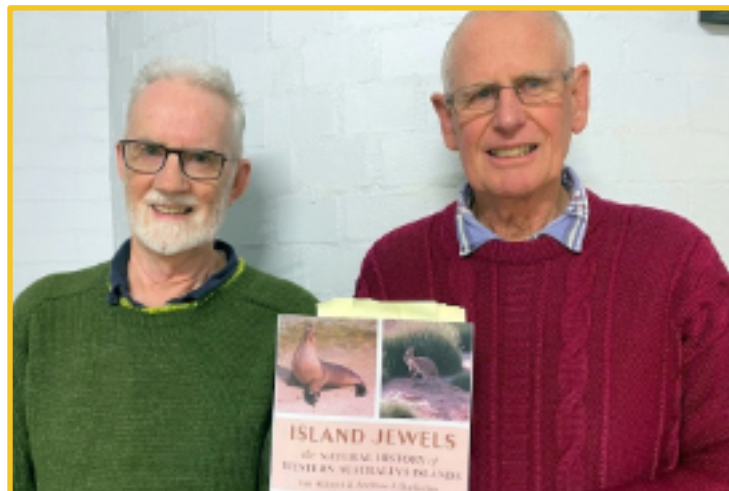

A very thought provoking talk which was enjoyed by all.



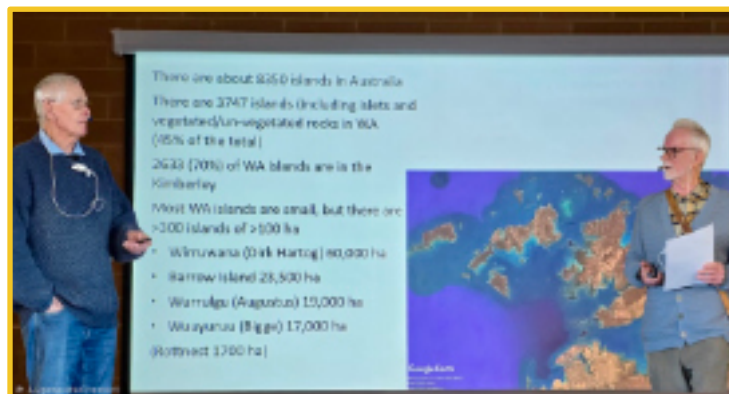
Dr Andrew A Burbidge & Dr Ian Abbott “Island Jewels”



On June 16th we had an enthralling talk on the “Islands Jewels of Western Australia” from Dr. Andrew & DR.Ian. They confessed they wrote the book “Island Jewels” as a Covid project.

Andrew is a conservation biologist who worked for state government conservation agencies for 33 years and has since been continuing this work. His main research areas include/included biological survey and conservation reserve design and acquisition; island survey, biosecurity and management; control of invasive species; Aboriginal oral history of mammals and fire; and threatened species conservation, especially mammals. He is chair of the WA Threatened Species Scientific Committee and the Barrow Island Gorgon Gas Development Quarantine Expert Panel.

Ian Abbott spent most of his career as a research scientist in the WA Public Service (1979-2014). Since retiring he has continued some of this work and ventured into new subjects. These include island and mainland ecology and evolution in WA and beyond; ecological study of Jarrah, Banksia grandis, and the forest avifauna; Noongar fire regimes and their names for bird and mammal species; and mammal extinction in WA.



Patrick John Barlett - Diamonds



Tuesday 7th July we had a most interesting talk for a U3A member, Patrick John Bartlett.

Patrick is a member of The Southern African Institute of Mining & Metallurgy and a trustee for De Beers Pension Fund and De Beers Benefit Society. He also holds an undergraduate degree from the University of London, a doctorate from the University of Pretoria, and a graduate degree from the University of South Africa, and currently holds positions at The Southern African Institute of Mining & Metallurgy, De Beers Pension Fund, and De Beers Benefit Society.

With all that you can understand he has a great degree of knowledge about items that are all girl's best friends, Diamonds.

Patrick's talk took us through their history, discovery, beauty and value which proved to be a riveting story, especially as he showed how diamonds on earth can never be repeated on other planets. Thank you for a most instructive talk.

Stephen Luke JP - Health Directive



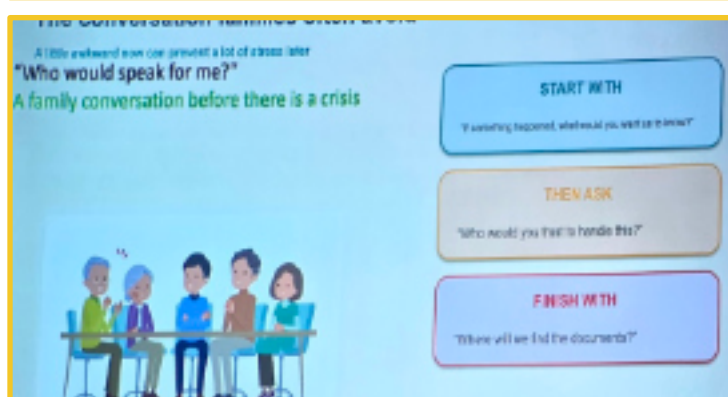
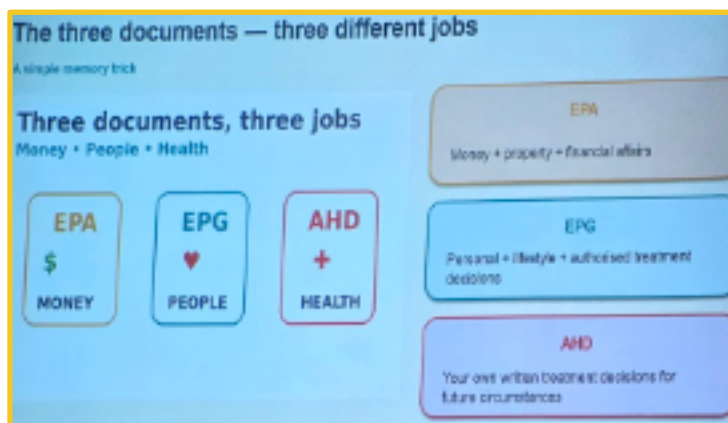
It's not very often that we overrun our speakers normal allotment of time, but today 18th August was one of those occasions.

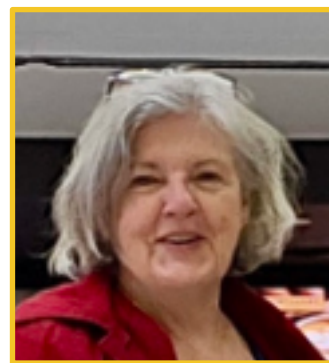
